In the last 20 years, churches in our constituency have seen a sharp decline in the number of people surrendering for missions.

We believe that **the central action to reverse this trend is prayer.**At Baptist Mid-Missions' 100th anniversary celebration in 2020, BMM's president, Dr. Patrick Odle, unveiled **Advance the Vision.** In this long-term missions renewal challenge, he invited people to partner with BMM in five critical goals.

Goal #1 is to inspire partners to join with us in **praying Matthew 9:38**, asking God to send more laborers into His harvest. Because you have this guide in your hands, we know you're serious about prayer. Pray daily for more workers, or twice a day as Dr. Odle suggested, **at 9:38 am and pm**.







To give credit where it's due, the idea for the booklet was inspired by 30-day prayer guides created by an evangelical ministry called World Christian. In the 30 years that people have prayed using their Muslim prayer guides, unprecedented numbers of Muslims have discovered who Jesus Christ is and have received Him as their Savior.

That's the power of prayer! Imagine what God could do through laser-focused prayers lifted by an army of praying warriors among our supporting churches. Those churches would be reinforced, and our world could be reached like never before.

Families: heart for missions

f you ask missionaries how God called them into missions, a common thread runs through many of their stories: the influence of their families. Children who grow up with

families who regularly read missionary biographies, host missionaries in their homes, and emphasize the Great Commission are likely to develop a respect and love for missions.

When parents hold missionaries in high esteem, kids learn that missionaries are heroes worthy of honor and emulation. When they hear stories of missionaries like Jim and Elisabeth Elliot, Mary Slessor, Hudson Taylor, or BMM's founder William Haas, children absorb the traits of outstanding Christian role models.

When parents host missionaries in their home, either for meals or housing, the conversational interactions are priceless. One BMM missionary remembers sitting

on her father's lap, absorbing the stories of their missionary guests. She learned how God's Word could transform an entire society. And today she is a Bible translator.

Whether God calls your kids into missions or leads them to champion missions in their adulthood, exposing children to missions in a positive way is a win-win.

Missionaries are people like you and me.



People often think of missionaries as "Super Christians," people who know all the right

answers and who have risen above the problems common to the rest of us.

That's a myth, of course, but one thing missionaries have learned is how to be surrendered disciples. And that starts in families and churches.

A core tenet of discipleship is the understanding that the path of becoming more like Christ is difficult. Surrendered disciples are willing to follow Christ, even when He asks them to do hard things, so that God can be glorified. They are not derailed by the lure of materialism or deadening comforts.

Surrendered disciples learn resilience. They keep running even when the wind is in their face and the rain pours on them. They tell God, "The fight is over to determine the course of my own life. My life is yours; do what you want through me." There is no end to the opportunities that a surrendered Christian can have to impact eternity.

- The desire to set your heart and mind on things above (Col. 3:1-2) and to walk closely with Christ in a joyful relationship (2 Peter 3:18).
- The willingness to risk more, to sacrifice more, and the wisdom to know when and where God is leading you to do this (Ro. 12:1-2).
- Resilience to stay the course in the growth and service God is working in your life, looking to what lies ahead (1 Peter 1:13).

hen Jesus spoke about the urgency of God's harvest of souls, 200 million people lived on earth. That's about 2/3rds of the current US population. Today eight billion people live on earth. If the harvest was plentiful in Jesus's day, how much more in our day.

Missions is the lifeblood of churches, an exalted commission that brings life to the world. Missions-minded churches create an atmosphere of Great Commission interest by preaching on

missions, inviting missionary appointees for meetings, maintaining close contact with supported missionaries, and teaching

Like other missions-minded pastors, Jeff Miller of Agnew Road Baptist Church in South Carolina strives to show his church that the Great Commission is the reason why we're here. Six of their families serve in missions.

issions-focused churches like Agnew Road, instill into their people a growing consciousness of the world's needs. They encour-

age and embrace surrender toward missions. In so doing, they benefit the spiritual health of their entire congregation.

The fuel that launches missionaries into action

"Pray-Give-Go." You've heard it over and over. Don't let it slip into cliché, because the two critical actions that always stand behind "going" are praying and giving.

If we could see the invisible, supernatural power unleashed by persevering prayer, we would be astounded at our intercession's impact. Europe's famous 100-Year Prayer Meeting led to the world's first major Protestant missionary movement, shaping the course of Christianity to this day. Imagine what could happen in our day if we consistently asked God

"For I hope to see you on my journey, and to be helped on my way there by you."

-Romans 15:24

to raise up more workers to reach the world's lost people?

Likewise, missionaries depend on consistent prayer and finances to get them to their fields and to keep them

there. Ask your church to consider regularly adjusting your missionaries' support for inflation or checking if they've lost support. This helps reduce extra trips back home to raise more support.

- Churches to set missions as a prayer focus, to share missionaries' needs, and to encourage fervent missions prayer.
- More workers; especially pray for people you know who have good missionary qualifications. God may be working in their lives.
- Courage and faith to step out in greater missions giving. Ask God to show you and your church the far-reaching impact of your giving.

Surrender toward the best plan possible

One of BMM's missionary appointee couples tells how their church reads missionary letters every Wednesday night. The Lord was already working in the husband's heart about New Zealand. When the church read Art and Deb Brammer's prayer request for their retirement replacement in New Zealand, the wife leaned over to her husband and said, "Maybe that's us."

The way God worked in this couple's lives is common. He brought people across their path that made



them think about New Zealand. Everywhere they turned, New Zealand came to mind. In time, they both had peace about missions.

Have you ever seriously considered, "Maybe it's me, or my family, that God is calling to missions?" If that thought terrifies you, remember

this: God graciously prepares everyone He calls, and His plan is so perfectly tailored for your personality and giftedness, you won't be satisfied by anything else.

Where missionaries are cultivated

An effective missionary must prepare for service, and that makes Bible colleges and seminaries vital training grounds for missions. Baptist Mid-Missions maintains connections with nearly 20 like-minded Bible colleges and seminaries that consistently plan ways to expose students to missions.

Students are challenged to consider missions when colleges plan vibrant chapel services that invite missionary graduates to speak. Colleges focused on the Great Commission also organize mission teams and encourage students to participate in them and to be involved in local outreach.

Missions prayer groups are not as common as they once were, but some colleges still have groups that meet weekly. In addition to the benefit of prayer itself, these groups engage students in what God is doing around the world, and they give ready opportunities for the Holy Spirit to work in their lives.

Many Bible colleges and seminaries employ former missionaries as professors who give students deep-level insights and practical guidance on how to prepare. Some institutions are adding tracks in technology, business, and languages to equip students to enter Creative Access Nations.

uring his senior year of Bible college, Travis Gravley was challenged to pray Matthew 9:38, the school's missions conference emphasis. The student missions group

also encouraged others to pray with them and consider missions. Their passion and burden spilled over into many lives, including Travis's.

Travis had been a youth ministries major, but as he faithfully prayed Matthew 9:38, he clearly sensed God saying, "You're one of those who needs to go." He finished his degree and went on to seminary.

He and his wife, Becky, served in Romania until God led Travis into BMM administration, where he now challenges college students to consider missions.

Short-term service: a missions test drive

People have so many options of what they can do with their lives that it's sometimes hard to cultivate skills and experience in a particular area until they start working in that field and gain some experience.

Missions is no different. Internships and short-term missions service give young adults a front-row seat to missions. It shows them that missions is real people with real needs that God can use them to meet. Their picture of missions changes from a two-dimensional one to 3D.

Short-term missions offers people a testing ground to see how their skills fit into a mission field. They gain a clearer picture of God's leading.

The step toward missions can feel overwhelming, even fearful. Short-term opportunities help people ease into the adjustments of missions, such as culture shock, language acquisition, and the transitions of leaving home. They find that missions is not as intimidating as they thought, and they learn they have something to offer in building Christ's church around the world.

- Young adults (and adults of any age) to seriously investigate how their skills can be used short-term on the mission field.
- Good interaction between shorttermers and their missionary hosts, that the missionaries could share their wisdom and insights.
- Short-term experiences to be positive and eye-opening and that God will use them to lead people into career missions.

Urban Africa on the rise

Picture Africa in your mind, and you might think rural villages and people living in grass huts. Although many Africans still live this way, their continent has drastically changed over the last several decades.

Africa's population has grown exponentially—from 229 million in 1950 to nearly 1.4 billion in 2020.

In the next 30 years it's expected to double. Along with this trend comes Africa's rapid urbanization. By 2050, a projected 950 million people will migrate to cities, producing megacities across Africa.



Missions to Africa must flex to embrace the enormous potential of Africa's urban centers. This includes not only pioneer church planting but also educating and equipping national leaders through discipleship and ministry training.

Opportunities still exist

among rural communities, but when people are in transition, they are more open to new ideas. This season is ripe for urban Africans to embrace their Savior.

A gateway to reach Muslims

Situated on the western coast of Africa, the country of Senegal lies within the 10/40 Window, where some of the world's largest unreached people groups live. In terms of missions, Senegal is an anomaly. Although the country is 90 percent Muslim, the government allows missionaries to live and work within Senegal.

Baptist Mid-Missions is seeking workers for this crucial mission field. Think of

the possibilities of reaching a nation like this. Not only could missionaries freely share the gospel and start churches, but they could also reach people who have migrated to Senegal from other Muslim nations closed to missionaries.

In all of the African nations where BMM currently has ministries (https://www.bmm.org/serve/where-we-serve/africa), Muslim ministry opportunities exist. Islam is the world's fastest-growing major religion. Pray that God burdens people with a heart to reach Muslims with the hope of Christ.

- Christians to no longer fear this people group but to develop a deep compassion for Muslims, recognizing their spiritual needs.
- God to equip and call workers to Senegal and other nations with populations of Muslim people.
- Mod to bring a harvest so that many Muslims find a personal relationship with the God who loves them and gave His life for them.

Opportunities CAN: Africa & Middle East



n one African nation, BMM missionaries were told that you could count on one hand the number of people who had come to Christ in the last 40 years. It bore testimony to Islam's grip on that country. Through the missionaries' caring witness, God added to that number a woman who was so overjoyed at her newfound faith that she bravely requested public baptism so she could testify how Jesus changed her life.

Another missionary couple serves faithfully in the Middle East in a community with ancient religious traditions. They are raising money to build

Some segments of Africa and virtually all of the Middle Fast are considered Creative Access Nations (CAN), where missionary visas are not granted. BMM missionaries have entered these countries by offering essential business start-ups or needed medical or social services.

Getting the Word to the world

Church planting and discipleship cannot make significant progress without a Bible in the people's language. Although a large number of people groups already have their own Bibles, almost 4,000 still do not.

Bibles International, BMM's Bible translation society, was founded in 1981 to provide reliable Bible translations for our missionaries' work. Bibles International not only gets Bibles into the hands of those who still wait, but they also teach the people to read and fully use their new Scriptures.

Almost 4,000 language groups still have no Bible.

In our lifetimes, we will have continuing needs for more translation consultants and specialists in literacy and Scripture engagement.

With several office personnel due to retire in the near future, Bibles International also needs qualified individuals in the areas of advancement, finance, project management, and media design. (https://biblesint.org)

The statistics are jolting: More than half the world's population (4.6 billion people) call Asia home, yet it is the continent with the lowest percentage of Christians. Asia gave birth to two major religions that keep a firm hold on the hearts of its people: Buddhism and Hinduism.

No Buddhist majority country has ever seen any significant awakening to the gospel of Jesus Christ. When we think of places, peoples, and countries that are resistant to the gospel, our minds



often rush to Muslim nations, places that violently and vehemently oppose the gospel of Jesus. However, let us remember there are countries that, although not violently resistant, are as equally needy for the gospel's message.

any Asian countries are difficult to enter, but among the majority Buddhist countries, Cambodia, Thailand, and Japan are nations where the gospel can be freely shared. The door is open, yet the workers are still so incredibly few.

Establish the work of our hands

Goal #5 of Advance the Vision is for BMM. to enter 20 new fields and ministries in the next 20 years. Asia is a continent ripe with these possibilities.


Many of these fields are Creative Access Nations. However, with people fleeing countries like Pakistan and Afghanistan, refugees from Creative Access Nations (CAN) are settling in countries like Thailand or Cambodia, where missionaries are free to work.

More workers are also needed to replace those retiring throughout Asia. In Japan alone, five of our 10 missionaries will retire in the near future.

In the 1980s, BMM gained entry into a Creative Access Nation through establishing a hospital. This nation is in harvest phase. The Lord has used this medical ministry to see more than 1,000 people saved and 17 churches established, BMM's team there has expanded to seven people, but our missionary doctor is over 70 years old. We do not yet have another doctor to take his place. Without a doctor, the hospital will likely close and our other missionaries lose their visa status.

We ask urgent prayer for these needs. Our goal is to expand even beyond maintaining the works God has already started.

Rescuing people behind closed doors

The vast majority of Creative Access Nations lie in Asia. These are countries that grant no missionary or religious worker's visas and officially forbid the practice of Christianity. In each nation, this suppression comes from majority religions or dictatorial governments. Ironically, religious and political oppression often create a climate of extreme thirst for the gospel.

In generations past, missions challenges took the form of travel difficulties, extreme poverty,

disease, and lack of modern medicine. Our generation can meet the challenge of CANs with willingness, creativity, and perseverance. People with pioneering spirits can enter these countries as English teachers, business people, and medical workers.

A skill or business considered necessary within the country, along with a solid Bible education, equips workers to take the gospel where it is most needed. CAN ministry is not easy, but it is needed desperately.

A decimated spiritual landscape

Baptist Mid-Missions' first Europe missionaries arrived in 1946. Many WWII soldiers had seen the devastation brought to Europe, and they sacrificed to renew spiritual life on that decimated continent.

A new battle in the form of postmodernism has decimated Europe's spiritual landscape, shearing peo-

ple's hearts away from Christianity. Not only that, but immigrants are rapidly multiplying the number who adhere to Islam, Hinduism, and other religions.



After years of robust missionary presence in Europe, a large number of BMM missionaries have retired or are soon to retire. Three of our fields (Austria, Finland, and Ireland) sit vacant with no missionaries to fill the shoes of those who left.


It is sometimes said

A gateway to reach the world

The island of Malta is the world's tenth-smallest country, but it packs huge missions potential. A devoutly Catholic nation, Malta is a hub for international shipping, cryptocurrency, and tourism. In this environment, a team of BMM missionaries has reached people with the gospel and established a church and Bible institute.

Through ministries like discipleship and Teaching English as a Second Language, BMM's Malta team is finding tremendous potential to reach people from all over the world—an opportunity found in many other European nations as well.

With its proximity to north Africa, Malta is a strategic location for forays into the 10/40 Window. Europe as a whole is an emigration landing point for people from every continent, and ministry potential abounds for work among refugees and immigrants from closed countries.

any things can wedge themselves between missionaries and their calling. When missionaries see little fruit for their

hard labor, discouragement can be suffocating. This is especially true for those having no coworkers to share their burdens and lift their spirits. Loneliness is a special challenge for single missionaries, and health challenges can affect anyone on the mission field.

Missionaries are special targets of the enemy, who loves to stir up conflicts among coworkers and within families. These can cripple missionaries' effectiveness. Add to that the increasing

moral decline found in any culture. Any of these issues can make missionaries want to throw in the towel, or they can disqualify them for service.


hen attrition happens, and no one is ready to take a missionary's place, missions momentum reverses. As mission fields thrive, more ministries are established, with property and finances to care for. This is a good thing, because more people are reached. But when fields empty of their missionaries, those who remain behind become consumed with managing these details, with little time to conduct ministry.

- Protection of missionaries' spirits, bodies, and relationships so they can stay in their calling.
- Special encouragement, nourishing relationships, and growing resilience in those who serve so they thrive and function as effectively as possible.
- New missionaries (and national workers) to take the place of those who have left so that ministry momentum keeps progressing.





Opportunities >> Latin America: Brazil



Urban, rural, and everything in-between

Brazil encompasses everything from the Amazon's indigenous peoples to the Africanized culture of the northeast all the way to European-flavored gaucho cowboy culture and São Paulo's vast urban setting.

Baptist Mid-Missions has been working in Brazil since 1935, but with Brazil's population of nearly 215 million, missionaries will never run out of opportunities. We need workers in the interior areas of Ceará, Maranhão, Pará, Minas Gerais and São Paulo states. Our urban church-planting teams in

Camp ministries in Peru and Honduras urgently need missionary personnel to establish these ministries or to replace personnel.



Bible colleges in Peru and the Dominican Republic are working toward offering postgraduate degrees and need qualified missionary professors.

Despite years of missionary presence, Latin America has many missions frontiers. Uruguay, Paraguay, and

Columbia have Latin America's lowest percentage of evangelical Christians. BMM also seeks missionaries to reactivate ministries in Guyana, Jamaica, Puerto Rico, and St. Lucia.

"We have yet to see good Sunday School literature in Spanish that teaches biblical doctrine." In 1960, this need prompted

four BMM missionaries to create *Editorial Bautista Independiente* (EBI). God has blessed this ministry beyond what its founders may have imagined.

Today EBI publishes an entire Sunday School curriculum for primary age through adults. Pastors and churches in more than 30 Spanish-speaking countries around the world trust EBI materials. Hispanic ministries in Germany, Australia, and Japan also use their resources.

EBI offers more than Sunday School materials. They produce theological texts, topical studies, and resources for Christian living in print and digital formats.

For many years a major obstacle to our counseling/training ministry was the lack of theological and practical resources for biblical counseling in Spanish. God answered our prayers by sending a key ministry partner in EBI.

-Pastor Juan, Ecuador EBI is expanding its distributor network to place more materials into people's hands. With the rise of the prosperity gospel in Latin America, EBI offers doctrinally sound materials to anchor churches and theological institutions.

North America: The world's largest unchurched English-speaking mission field

It is imperative that Christians dispel the myths that North America is still a Christian nation and that missions is only for foreign lands. Thankfully, North America exerted a substantial Christian influence for centuries, but today only China and India have larger populations of non-Christians than we do. Our continent is the only one where Christianity is not growing.

Over the last two decades, North American culture has increasingly rejected Christian beliefs and values. Even in areas still filled with churches, fewer churches are actively reaching their communities for Christ or functioning in a genuinely healthy capacity. Four thousand churches are closing yearly.

North America is a strategic location to reach immigrants from all over the world, but if we don't also reach those already here, the vitality of the North American church will continue to deteriorate.

The statistics are discouraging, but your prayers are powerful for reversing these declines. North America greatly needs vibrant churches that follow Jesus's Acts 1:8 model of being witnesses locally and globally.



As with BMM's Campus Bible Fellowship, missionaries to the Pacific have plentiful opportunities to reach many of the world's peoples in one place.



Papua New Guinea is the world's the most linguistically diverse nation. Bible translators, church planters, educators, and medical personnel will find ready work.

In recent years, Australia has limited the missionary visas it grants, but innovative mis-

sionary pioneers can use business ventures to enter the country. Australia and New Zealand have grown spiritually apathetic and greatly need missionaries.

Passing the baton to the next generation

For a track team to win a relay race, they must successfully pass the baton from one team member to the next until the finish line.

What a perfect example of intergenerational teamwork in missions.

Missionaries make it their goal to strategically disciple nationals to pass ministries to them. Sometimes this process must continue after the missionaries retire because the national church is not yet sufficiently established to maintain ministries in their country. On several BMM fields, missionaries have retired, but no one has been available to carry on their ministries. These fields now sit dormant. This is greatly discouraging to national churches, who want our continued help.

This situation is found around the world as far more missionaries retire than new missionaries come to offset them. The race will not be finished until we reach heaven. Who will pick up retirees' batons to run the race after them?

- God to prepare new workers who have the specific qualifications and burdens to fill retirees' shoes.
- BMM mission fields like Mexico and others that have no missionaries ready to take the place of retirees.
- Fields such as St. Lucia, Ireland, Hawaii, Guyana, Jamaica, Puerto Rico, and others with no BMM missionaries.




